#### **Local Traffic Committee**

#### **Background**

Transport for NSW (TfNSW) is legislated as the Authority responsible for the control of traffic on all NSW Roads. In order to deal with the large number and range of traffic related matters, TfNSW has delegated certain aspects of the control of traffic on local roads to Council (under the Transport Administration Act 1988). To exercise this delegation, Councils must establish a Local Traffic Committee (LTC) and obtain the advice of the TfNSW and NSW Police.

#### **Role of the Committee**

The LTC is primarily a technical review and advisory committee which considers the technical merits of proposals and ensures that current technical guidelines are considered. It provides recommendations to Council on traffic and parking control matters and the provision of traffic control facilities and prescribed traffic control devices for which Council has delegated authority. The Committee also advises on traffic matters arising from development applications (regulatory signage and line marking only), special events and road safety issues.

#### **Committee Delegations**

The LTC has no decision-making powers. Council must refer all traffic related matters to the Local Traffic Committee prior to exercising its delegated functions. Matters related to State Roads or functions that have not been delegated to Council must be referred directly to the TfNSW or relevant organisation.

The Committee provides recommendations to Council. Council is not bound by the advice of its LTC. Council can choose not to proceed with a recommendation of the Local Traffic Committee by not endorsing it at a Council Meeting where the minutes are presented.

Should Council wish to act contrary to the advice of the Committee or if that advice is not supported unanimously by the Committee members, Council must write to both the TfNSW and NSW Police, who may then choose to appeal to the Regional Traffic Committee within 14 days.

#### **Committee Membership**

The LTC is made up of four formal voting members. The members are as follows:

- one representative of Council as nominated by Council;
- one representative of the NSW Police from each Local Area Command (LAC) within the LGA;
- one representative from the TfNSW; and
- the local State Member(s) of Parliament (MP) or their nominee.

Where the Council area is represented by more than one MP or covered by more than one Police LAC, representatives are only permitted to vote on matters within their electorate or LAC.



The role of the four voting members is to:

- review the information provided to the committee.
- advise whether or not the technical justification of facilities meet the relevant guidelines and standards (facilities include lines, signs and devices).
- ensure that the recommendations conform to the matters being referred to and should be recommended for Council to endorse.

#### In relation to this:

- I. The council representatives and Local Members of Parliament (or representative) typically consider the interests of Council and its constituents. Both representatives on the Committee provide valued local knowledge.
- II. The Transport for NSW (TfNSW) representative provides advice on compliance of the matters with regards to various standards and guidelines.
- III. The NSW Police representative provides input on implications for the road network, particularly where a proposal may affect road safety.

The Committee may also have additional informal (non-voting) advisors. These may include:

- Council Officers
- Chamber of Commerce representatives
- Bus Operator representatives
- Other representatives as determined from time to time.

The informal advisors are not required to attend every LTC meeting. Their attendance is only necessary when items appear on the Agenda which affect their area of expertise or responsibility. The informal advisors are not entitled to a vote.

Please note there is no public gallery for these meetings.

#### LTC Business Paper

Council is responsible for preparing an LTC agenda and circulates to all formal members and informal advisors of the committee approximately one week prior to the meeting. This will allow members to fully consider the issues and determine their response on each item.

Council encourages each member of the LTC to undertake a site visit prior to considering any proposal. Site visits may be undertaken individually or organised with Council's Traffic Engineer(s).

SUBJECT: BARLEY ROAD, SPRING FARM - NO STOPPING RESTRICTIONS AT

**INTERSECTIONS**

#### **PURPOSE OF REPORT**

To seek Local Traffic Committee concurrence for No Stopping restrictions at the intersections of Barley Road with Millman Road and Wagner Road.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Concerns have been raised regarding vehicles parking too close to intersections on Barley Road near Spring Farm Public School, compromising sightlines. No Stopping restrictions are proposed to address this.

#### **MAIN REPORT**

Barley Road is local road fronting Spring Farm Public School and extending from Springs Road to Harland Road. Vehicles have been observed parked too close to the intersections, particularly at school drop off and pick up times, impeding sightlines. An Overview Plan is provided in **Attachment 1**.

It is proposed to install signage to reinforce the NSW Road Rules which prohibit stopping within 10 metres of an intersection. Full-time No Stopping (R5-400) restrictions are proposed for 10 metres on all approaches to the intersections of Barley Road with Millman Road and Wagner Road (see **Attachment 2**). There are existing restrictions along the southern side of the intersection of Barley Road with Wagner Road and on the northern side of Millman Road where a sign is missing.

Consultation was undertaken with adjacent owners and occupants regarding the proposed No Stopping restrictions. One response was received. The response outlined support of the restrictions however did not support having a sign outside their property on the northern side of Millman Road but supported extending to 20 metres to the boundary line on the eastern side of their driveway.

#### FINANCIAL AND ASSET MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS

It is proposed that the cost of installation be funded from the TfNSW Block Grant (Traffic Facilities Component) for the 2022/23 financial year at an approximate cost of \$1,500.

#### CONCLUSION

Following concern about vehicles being parked close to intersections on Barley Road, it is recommended that the Committee supports the installation of No Stopping restrictions.



#### **RECOMMENDED**

The Local Traffic Committee recommends that Council approves in Barley Road, Spring Farm:

- i. 10 metres of No Stopping (R5-400 signage) at the intersection with Millwood Avenue; and
- ii. 10 metres of No Stopping (R5-400 signage) at the intersection with Wagner Road.

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

SUBJECT: MACARTHUR ROAD, ELDERSLIE - NO STOPPING RESTRICTIONS

AT THE INTERSECTION WITH PURCELL STREET

#### **PURPOSE OF REPORT**

To seek Local Traffic Committee concurrence for No Stopping restrictions at the intersection of Macarthur Road with Purcell Street.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Concerns have been raised regarding vehicles parking too close to intersections on Macarthur Road with Purcell Street compromising sightlines. No Stopping restrictions are proposed to address this.

#### **MAIN REPORT**

Macarthur Road is a 12.3-metre-wide collector road which intersects with Purcell Street and Harrington Street at a crossroads near the neighbourhood centre. Purcell Street intersects at an acute angle and double barrier lines currently exist along Purcell Street on the approach to the intersection which prohibit adjacent parking.

Vehicles have been observed parked on Macarthur Road too close to the intersection, exacerbated by the road geometry. This impedes sightlines for motorists seeking to exit Purcell Street. No Stopping restrictions are proposed for 10 metres on Macarthur Road and extending 20 metres along the western side and 15 metres along the eastern side of Purcell Street (see **Attachment 1**).

Consultation was undertaken with adjacent owners and occupants. Two responses were received. One response supported the proposal in its entirety. The second response requested the restriction on the western side of Macarthur Road be extended to 20 metres. The extension would result in the elimination of a car parking space and would require further consultation. It is recommended that the proposed 10 metres is progressed, and the location continue to be monitored.

#### FINANCIAL AND ASSET MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS

It is proposed that the cost of installation be funded from the TfNSW Block Grant (Traffic Facilities component) for the 2022/23 financial year at an approximate cost of \$1,000.

#### **CONCLUSION**

Following concerns about vehicles being parked close to the intersection, it is recommended that the Committee supports the installation of No Stopping restrictions.



#### **RECOMMENDED**


The Local Traffic Committee recommends that Council approves at the intersection of Macarthur Road with Purcell Street, Elderslie:

- (i) No Stopping (R5-400 signage) restrictions for 10 metres in either direction on Macarthur Road; and
- (ii) No Stopping (R5-400 signage) restrictions for 20 metres on the western side and 15 metres on the eastern side of Purcell Street.

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SUBJECT: ASCOT DRIVE, CURRANS HILL - CENTRE AND EDGE LINE-

#### **PURPOSE OF REPORT**

To seek Local Traffic Committee concurrence for the installation of centre and edge line-marking along Ascot Drive, Currans Hill.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Concerns have been raised regarding driver behaviour along Ascot Drive, Currans Hills. Line-marking is proposed to help address the issue.

#### **MAIN REPORT**

Ascot Drive is a collector road in Currans Hill with a variable width extending northwards from Turner Road. The northern section measures 7.8 metres in width and has double centre lines. The southern section, south of Manooka Road, measures 12.4 metres in width and has no line marking.

To manage speeds and to ensure vehicles keep left, edge line-marking (E1) and dashed centre line-marking (S1) are proposed along Ascot Drive between the intersections with Manooka Road and Turner Road. Double barrier line-marking (BB) is proposed on the approaches to the intersections (see **Attachment 1**).

Public consultation was undertaken with affected owners and occupiers and two responses were received. Both supported the installation of line marking however sought to raise concern regarding bottlenecking along Turner Road between Bridle Road and Hilltop Avenue. This proposed line-marking was limited to Ascot Drive and as such the issues in the response will be investigated separately.

#### FINANCIAL AND ASSET MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS

The estimated cost of the recommended work is \$2,000. It is proposed that the cost be funded from the TfNSW Block Grant (Traffic Facilities Component) for the 2022/23 financial year.

#### **CONCLUSION**

Concerns have been raised regarding driver behaviour in Ascot Drive, Currans Hill, and it is recommended that the Committee supports line-marking to help address the issues.



#### **RECOMMENDED**

The Local Traffic Committee recommends that Council approves in Ascot Drive, Currans Hill, between Manooka Road and Turner Road, edge line-marking (E1) and separation line-marking (S1) with 15 metres of double barrier line-marking (BB) at the southern end.

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SUBJECT: LEDWELL WAY, ORAN PARK - CENTRE LINES AND GIVE WAY

TREATMENT AT INTERSECTION WITH STONEHAM CIRCUIT

#### **PURPOSE OF REPORT**

To seek Local Traffic Committee concurrence for centre line-marking and Give way treatment on Ledwell Way, Oran Park at the intersection with Stoneham Circuit.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Community concerns have been raised regarding motorists not giving way at the intersection of Ledwell Way at Stoneham Circuit, Oran Park, with sightlines being impeded by parked vehicles. A give way treatment and line-marking are proposed to address this.

#### **MAIN REPORT**

Ledwell Way in Oran Park is 8 metres wide, and Stoneham Circuit has a varied width between 8 metres, west of the intersection, and 9.4 metres wide, east of the intersection. The intersection of Ledwell Way with Stoneham Circuit is a modified T-intersection. The default speed limit of 50km/h. Both roads have unrestricted parking, however double barrier lines are in place on Stoneham Circuit with no break at the intersection.

The priority at the modified T-intersection is unclear and is a factor in vehicles failing to give way on Ledwell Way. It is therefore proposed to install a Give Way treatment at the intersection with 10 metre double barrier (BB) centre lines along Ledwell Way. Because of the road widths of both Ledwell Way and Stoneham Circuit, the centre lines will restrict adjacent kerbside parking. This will also address concerns about parking too close to the intersection, impeding sight lines.

Consultation was undertaken with adjacent owners and occupants regarding the Give Way and centre line installation. No responses were received.

#### FINANCIAL AND ASSET MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS

It is proposed that the cost of the signage and line marking be funded from the TfNSW Block Grant (Traffic Facilities component) for the 2022/23 financial year at an approximate cost of \$1,500.

#### CONCLUSION

Concerns have been raised regarding driver behaviour at the intersection of Ledwell Way with Stoneham Circuit, Oran Park, and it is recommended that the Committee supports the installation of the Give Way treatment and double barrier centre lines.



#### **RECOMMENDED**

The Local Traffic Committee recommends that Council approves in Ledwell Way, Oran Park, at the intersection with Stoneham Circuit:

- i. Give Way signage (R1-2) and line-marking (TB and TB1);
- ii. 10 metres of double barrier (BB) centre line-marking; and
- iii. Removal of 7 metres double barrier centre line-marking (BB) along Stoneham Circuit.

#### **PURPOSE OF REPORT**

To seek Local Traffic Committee concurrence for line-marking parking bays in The Hermitage Way and Providence Drive in the vicinity of Gledswood Hills Public School.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Concerns have been raised regarding vehicles parking inefficiently near Gledswood Hills Public School, compromising sightlines. Marked parking bays are proposed to address this.

#### **MAIN REPORT**

The Hermitage Way and Providence Drive are collector roads on the boundaries of Gledswood Hills Public School. Specially designed indented parking bays have been constructed on these roads in the vicinity of the school and planned neighbourhood centre. The bays are 18 metres in length and 2.3 metres deep with separated by trees pits with kerbs which allow for overhanging vehicles. In addition, a bay for disability parking is 21 metres long and 3.4 metres wide.

Concerns have been raised regarding vehicles parking inefficiently reducing parking provision at school drop off and pick up times. It is proposed to line-mark the bays as shown in **Attachment 1**.

#### FINANCIAL AND ASSET MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS

It is proposed that the cost of installation be funded from the TfNSW Block Grant (Traffic Facilities Component) for the 2022/23 financial year at an approximate cost of \$2,500.

#### **CONCLUSION**



#### **PURPOSE OF REPORT**

To seek Local Traffic Committee concurrence for the installation of centre and edge line-marking along Elizabeth Street, Camden.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Concerns has been raised regarding driver behaviour along Elizabeth Street, Camden. Linemarking is proposed to help address the issue.

#### **MAIN REPORT**

Elizabeth Street is a collector road in Camden CBD which is 20 metres wide with angled parking on both sides of the road and parallel line-marked bays south of Larkin Place. There are existing double barrier lines on the approaches to Exeter Street, Mitchell Street and Argyle Street.

To assist vehicles in maintaining their lane managing speeds it is proposed to install a dashed centre lines (S1) between Argyle Street and Mitchell Street and between Mitchell Street and Exeter Street. A line marking curve is also proposed on the southern side of the intersection with Larkin Place to improve delineation (see **Attachment 1**).

#### FINANCIAL AND ASSET MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS

The estimated cost of the recommended work is \$2,000. It is proposed that the cost be funded from the TfNSW Block Grant (Traffic Facilities Component) for the 2022/23 financial year.

#### **CONCLUSION**

Concerns have been raised regarding driver behaviour in Elizabeth Street, Camden, and it is recommended that the Committee supports line-marking to help address the issues.



#### **RECOMMENDED**

The Local Traffic Committee recommends that Council approves in Elizabeth Street, Camden:

- (i) separation line-marking (S1) between existing double barrier line-marking (BB); and
- (ii) edge line-marked (E1) curve on the southern side of the intersection with Larkin Place.

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SUBJECT: MERINO DRIVE, ELDERSLIE - PEDESTRIAN REFUGE WITH

ASSOCIATED SIGNAGE AND LINE-MARKING

#### **PURPOSE OF REPORT**

To seek Local Traffic Committee concurrence for the modification of an existing pedestrian refuge crossing on Merino Drive, Elderslie.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Concerns has been raised regarding the existing pedestrian refuge crossing in Merino Drive. A design has been prepared which modifies the crossing to address the issues.

#### **MAIN REPORT**

Merino Drive is a collector road in Elderslie with a general width of 10.5 metres. There is an existing pedestrian refuge between Macarthur Road and Merriman Close with island kerb extensions on either side. There is no pram ramp on the northern side as it is constrained by a large tree. The crossing is used by people accessing Mawarra Public School at the end of Merriman Close. Concerns have been raised about the ramp and traffic exposure at the crossing.

The crossing has been redesigned with a longer kerb extension on the northern side (2 metres wide) tied into the existing kerb and incorporating a pram ramp. The refuge island has been enlarged to 2 metres deep and 3.6 metres wide. The existing kerb extension on the southern side is proposed to be removed. Drawing No. 2022-034 Sheet 4 of 5 provides details of the facility with associated signage and line-marking (see **Attachment 1**).

Public consultation was undertaken with affected owners and occupiers and previous complainants. Five responses were received. An adjacent resident did not object to the proposal. Four responses from people not living directly adjacent supported the upgrade but suggested a zebra crossing as well. When the project was developed, strict warrants were required to be met for zebra crossings to be approved. These were not met at this location. However, the crossing upgrade future-proofs the design for a zebra to be incorporated at a later date. A zebra crossing would also require flood lighting, necessitating further design, public consultation, Endeavour Energy approval and funding to be sourced for installation.

#### FINANCIAL AND ASSET MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS

The estimated cost of the recommended work is \$90,000. It is proposed that the cost be funded from the Pedestrian Access and Mobility Plan Program for the 2022/23 financial year.



#### **CONCLUSION**


Concerns have been raised regarding the design of an existing pedestrian refuge crossing in Merino Drive in Elderslie and it is recommended that the Committee supports the re-design.

#### RECOMMENDED

The Local Traffic Committee recommends that Council approves in Merino Drive, Elderslie, east of Macarthur Road, a refuge island, kerb extension and associated signage and line-marking as detailed in Drawing No. 2022-034 Sheet 4 of 5.

SUBJECT: ELYARD STREET, NARELLAN - NO STOPPING RESTRICTIONS

#### **PURPOSE OF REPORT**

To seek Local Traffic Committee concurrence for the installation of parking restrictions in Elyard Street, Narellan.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Concerns have been raised about poor visibility when exiting a private road on to Elyard Street and parking restrictions are proposed to help address the issue.

#### **MAIN REPORT**

Elyard Street is a local road and busy bus route in Narellan. The road width is approximately 12 metres. There is a dashed centre line, and the speed limit is 50km/h.

Parking in Elyard Street is generally busy due to the location in Narellan town Centre and including the Exchange building located at the corner of Elyard Street and Somerset Avenue. Medium density housing is under construction along Somerset Avenue with rear access via a private road which intersects with Elyard Street.

Numerous concerns have been raised about poor visibility when exiting the private road on to Elyard Street due to vehicles parked too close. Due to the private road accommodating significantly more traffic movements than a typical driveway, No Stopping restrictions are proposed to be placed 5 metres either side of the access on Elyard Street as shown in **Attachment 1**.

#### FINANCIAL AND ASSET MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS

It is proposed that the cost of signage be funded from the TfNSW Block Grant (Traffic Facilities Component) for the 2022/23 financial year at an approximate cost of \$300.

#### **CONCLUSION**

Concerns have been raised about poor sightlines when exiting a private road on to Elyard Street, and it is recommended that the committee supports No Stopping restrictions.



#### **RECOMMENDED**

The Local Traffic Committee recommends that Council approves in Elyard Street, Narellan, No Stopping restrictions (R5-400 signage), for 5 meters either side of the private road of 3 Elyard Street

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Community and Road Safety Action Plan is developed on a yearly basis to provide direction to the Community Road Safety Officer (CRSO). Projects and programs that are implemented in the Camden Local Government Area (LGA) are developed from both research and statistical analysis undertaken.

This report outlines the progress of projects being implemented in the 2022/23 financial year.


Macarthur Road, Spring Farm - Overview Plan



The event will include the closed portion of Central Ave, Perich Park Council Chambers and Library Forecourt. The below site diagram depicts the event location.


